



Snowy 2.0 tunnel boring components are coming soon

The first of three tunnel boring machines has arrived at Port Kembla

Future Generation would like to thank locals for their patience during the reconstruction of the roundabouts in Sharp Street to prepare for the arrival of the tunnel boring machines (TBMs).

We are working with NSW Police and agencies to safely transport the disassembled TBMs from Port Kembla to the Snowy Mountains.

The cargo will be in various sizes. Shipping containers of equipment and plastic-wrapped, individual TBM parts - some as large as 174 tonnes - will soon be transported to site at Lobs Hole.

Some loads will be very large and heavy and will require escorts. Some loads may also involve partial and full road closures.

The largest loads will mostly be transported at night to reduce traffic impacts. There will be no road closures scheduled across weekends.

For safety reasons, the largest loads will be transported from the Snowy Mountains Highway at the Four Mile to site during the daytime and this will involve intermittent, rolling road closures along the highway.

The schedule to deliver the TBM cargo is subject to weather and will continue through to near the end of the year.

The TBMs will be rebuilt on site and the first is planned to start tunnelling by the end of the year.
